Boost your score.

Practicing for the digital version of the test will help you identify the areas where you need the most support so you can sharpen your focus while studying. Plus, since the content on the SAT with Essay is tied to what you're learning in school, practicing for the SAT will set you up for success in your classes, too.

Historically, students who used Official SAT Practice on the paper and pencil version of the test for 6+ hours raised their scores by 39 points more than students who did not use Official SAT Practice.



Get comfortable with Bluebook.

Downloading Bluebook ahead of time and taking a practice test will help you get to know all the app's helpful features. Can you imagine taking the entire exam without realizing you could cross out incorrect choices or highlight information to help you answer questions?

Students can download Bluebook™, the new digital testing app from College Board, to take full-length digital practice tests and familiarize themselves with the app's helpful features, like formula sheets, digital accommodations, and built-in calculators. 2-3 MONTHS BEFORE TEST DAY



Create a practice schedule and stick to it. We recommend that students practice in Bluebook 15 to 30 minutes per day starting starting six to eight weeks before the test.

2 WEEKS BEFORE TEST DAY



Take another full-length practice test. Two weeks before every SAT test date is known as **Official SAT Practice Test Day**. On this day, students should take another full-length practice test in Bluebook to check their progress. This lets students build self-assurance and see exactly where to focus over the next two weeks to get the best possible score.

1 DAY BEFORE TEST DAY



Plan ahead. Triple-check the night before that your student packs everything needed, such as pencils for use with scratch paper and a calculator if they don't plan to use the built-in Desmos calculator.
